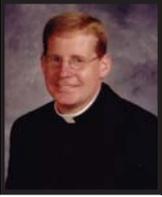


## Vocation Office Web Page Gets a Face Lift

## View from the Vineyard

Dear Friends,

On August 4, 2008, Bishop Melczek celebrated the Mass of Christian Burial for Fr. Richard Ameling, Pastor of St. Andrew the Apostle Church in Merrillville. I was sitting in the sanctuary and during Mass I looked up to see every bench, pew, and chair occupied and people lined up against the wall for the 75-minute celebration. I could not help but reflect on the impact Fr. Ameling made on the lives of the people who gathered on the rainy, humid day. I wonder if Fr. Ameling was surprised by the crowd!

In recent years, the Diocese of Gary has mourned the premature death of influential priests such as Fr. John Ambre, Fr. Richard Ameling, Fr. Edward Kennedy, Fr. Francis Lazar, Fr. Bill Martin, and Fr. Tony Valtierra. At their wakes and funerals, hundreds of women, men, and children filled church buildings. Lay people, priests and deacons traveled from the furthest points of the diocese to celebrate the contributions that each priest made during his years of ministry. The presence of so many people is an eloquent testimony of their ministry and their witness.

Even as I mourn the death of these men, I am also inspired to follow their example and make a contribution to the Catholic community and to the larger community. These men shared a variety of gifts: kindness, compassion, time, a sense of humor, vision, passion, and a willingness to meet people in their suffering. Judging from the participation at their funerals, these gifts made a difference for many people. This is what priests and religious can offer and this is what the faithful want: Witnesses of the kingdom of truth, justice, peace, forgiveness, and mercy.

On November 2, we will celebrate All Souls Day. As we remember the deceased priests and bishops of this diocese, please pray with me that their spirit of generosity may continue to swell in the hearts of priests and their intercession may lead many men and women to answer God's call to a life of witness as priests and consecrated religious!

- Photograph and biography of parish priests in the bulletin




## Vocation Awareness Posters Ready for Viewing

Normally, the vocation awareness poster is designed in the fall and distributed to diocesan parishes and schools in conjunction with National Vocation Awareness Week, which is commemorated during the second week of January. To prolong the life of the poster, the Vocation Office designed the poster which was distributed in the first half of the month of September.

Highlighting the three men ordained to the priesthood in June 2008, the poster prompts viewers to “answer the call” to the priesthood. Photographs of the 10 men preparing for priestly ministry in the Diocese of Gary are included, as well. The posters will also feature English and Spanish translations, printed on both sides of the paper.

**Sr. Gayle Lynn Rusbasan, O.S.F.** professed her perpetual vows as a Franciscan Sister of the Sacred Heart on August 2, 2008. She is from originally from Merrillville and was a member of St. Andrew the Apostle Parish. Sr. Gayle’s parents, William and Carol Rusbasan, continue to live in Merrillville and actively participate in the life of their parish. Sr. Gayle received her BA in Theology/Philosophy from St. Joseph’s College in Rensselaer, IN and her MA in English from Indiana State University in Terre Haute, IN.
